Many of the books that we have been able to get at a reduced rate, were supplied to us on the understanding that we would not be undercutting their suppliers. If you come from an urban area we will have to use our discretion in deciding whether to supply your order. This of course does not apply to our own publications.

We are also able now to offer a discount on some of the books to rural people who really cannot afford the full price. If you feel that applies to you, please write to us, telling us what your involvement in your community is and how the book you want will help that work, and we will be happy to consider your request. The books this applies to have the lower rate in brackets, next to the full price.

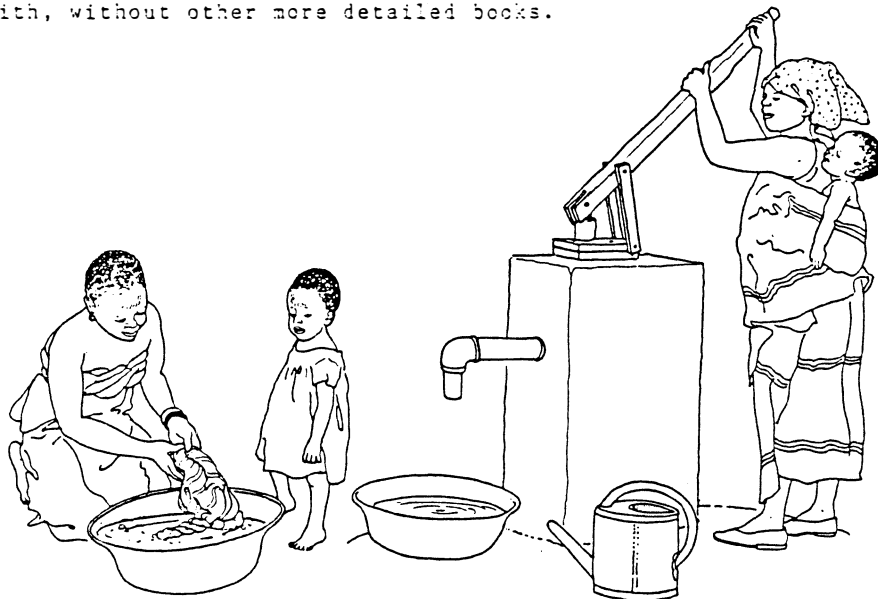
